





## **Funding Needs**

- Mechanical thinning
- Complementary restoration activities
  - And thinning
  - × wildlife habitat improvement
  - **\*** spring and channel restoration
  - × aspen protection
  - road closures
  - **×** invasive species removal
- Ecological and socio-economic monitoring
- Long-term maintenance of treatments







## **Flagstaff Bond Question #405**

#### <u>Amount:</u> \$10,000,000

<u>Description</u>: To prevent flood damage to the City of Flagstaff ("City") and to protect the City water supply from damages which occur from large-scale and/or severe wildfire(s) in two watersheds serving the City

 Accelerate planning and treatment activities within 4FRI area near Flagstaff



#### **Issues Important to Supporters**

- 55% Reduce the risk of post-fire flooding
- 54% Protect city water resources
- 36% Invest now to avoid future costs
- 34% Flagstaff and USFS will use money efficiently
- 33% Reduce the risk of catastrophic fire
- 32% Investment will have clear outcomes
- 16% Feds do not have sufficient resources
- 4% This will not cost much money

### **Issues Important to Opposition**

- 55% My taxes are already too high
- 37% Flagstaff and USFS will waste the money
- 30% I cannot afford to pay
- 19% Forest restoration not solution to water supply
- 17% I am opposed to thinning the forest
- 15% Private industry should pay for restoration
- 15% Unfair for citizens to pay for these projects
- 12% Feds should pay for restoration on Fed land
- 3% There are no real risks of future flood or fire








# **AZ Watershed Investment Fund**

Forest Restoration Collaboratives, State and Federal Agencies, Universities, NGOs, and others partner with large-scale utilities and other AZ businesses to raise funds to support statewide restoration efforts

- To encourage statewide awareness of need for and benefits of forest restoration
- To invest in the protection and conservation of Arizona's forests and riparian ecosystems by funding on-the-ground restoration activities that:
  - Significantly reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfires
  - Improve water supplies
  - o Enhance wildlife habitat
  - Create recreational opportunities
  - Generate jobs for Arizona residents
