Working With Corps

What is The Corps Network?

- The Corps Network is a national association of more than150 Service and Conservation Corps that operate in all 50 states.
- As the voice of the Corps in our nation's capital, TCN advocates for funding and favorable policies; facilitates relationships with a variety of partners; provides opportunities to participate in special projects and receive technical assistance; and helps tell the story of Corps and the Corps Movement.







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What are Service and Conservation Corps?

- Continuing the legacy of President Roosevelt's New Deal program, the Civilian Conservation Corps
- Operated by private non-profit organizations or state/local government entities
- Provide education, workforce development, and supportive services through a venue of national and community service to young people between the ages of 16 and 25, as well as recently returned military veterans.





Service and Conservation Corps Today

The Corps Network's 150 members Corps:

- Engage 30,000 young people each year
- Complete 21 Million hours of work / service
- Leverage 265,000 volunteers

**The Public Lands Service Coalition, made up of Corps and other conservation organizations, promotes youth service jobs and career development on public/tribal lands and waters.





Corpsmembers

30,000 young people each year

- primarily ages 16-25
- 63% male
- 58% young people of color
- 66% family income less than \$22,200



- 45% without HS diploma or GED
- 30% court involved
- 10% formerly in foster care






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The Corps Model

- Use environmental & conservation service to provide training & education to diverse & often disadvantaged youth
- 8-12 Corpsmembers working in crews.
- Hard, physical work that produces tangible benefits.
- Gain important skills, such as responsibility and teamwork, to move successfully into the workforce – including specialized skills training (i.e. chainsaw, hazmat, etc...).
- Youth are connected to supportive services, such as health care, child care, transportation, and career preparation.

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Improve Neighborhoods & Community Spaces

- community gardens, playgrounds
 & public spaces
- Planting grasses, trees, seedlings, and shrubs
- Recycling









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Improve access to public lands (for recreation and other activities)

- Constructing and maintaining trails, fences, corrals, bridges, retaining walls, irrigation culverts, and overlooks
- Building, restoring, and maintaining campgrounds and other recreational facilities









Protect Wildlife Habitat

Performing erosion control measures, including soil and shoreline stabilization







- Preserving and restoring stream banks and wetlands
- Preserving and restoring wildlife and riparian habitat
- Inventorying and removing invasive weeds



Prepare for & Respond to Disasters

- Stabilizing mud slides
- Removing debris and hazardous trees







Protect Communities from Wildfire

- Implementing controlled burns
- Removing hazardous fuels
- Supporting fire crews

- Expose diverse young people to the nation's public lands.
- Engage diverse young people in meeting critical environmental needs.
- Foster the next generation of earth stewards and public lands workers.

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Cost savings from using youth programs vary depending on labor types compared against (Contracted, In-House, or a Combination)


The "combination" cost type assumes 80% of work will be done with Contracted labor and the remaining 20% will be done with In-House labor
