



- Establish a group
- Develop a collaborative riparian restoration plan for the White River watershed



Funding: BOR WaterSMART Phase I

- Works across state boundaries
- Flexible
- Funds capacity, travel, contractor (eg facilitator)
- Eligible for Phase II Implementation funds

- Long application process
- Frequent and detailed reporting (may have changed)



Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

- Non-binding
- Narrow focus (riparian restoration)
- Broadly defined goals
 - Ecological/Geomorphic
 - Social
 - Cultural
 - Management
 - Economic

The Partnership can invite participation to serve as an advisory role. This may include participation from the Colorado Water Conservation Board, Natural Resources Conservation Service, White River and Douglas Creek Conservation Districts, and/or other entities. The advisory role to the Partnership may provide technical, research, and policy information to help the Partnership achieve its stated goals.

- Provide resources for best management practices
- Explain scientific background supporting riparian restoration
- Site prioritization guide
- List of 10 priority treatment areas


